Additional units will not be authorized to complete homemaker tasks that are secondary and contiguous • Family members are not eligible to be the client’s IHSS homemaker • IHSS Homemaker is not offered in the CHCBS waiver • IHSS Homemaker Services includes services that would be considered general household activities provided for an eligible client to maintain a healthy and safe home environment • Homemaker services should only be provided when the person ordinarily responsible for these activities is absent or unable to manage these tasks <p>Homemaker does not include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Personal care services • Services the person can perform independently • Services in shared spaces • Homemaker Services provided in uncertified congregate facilities are not a benefit

<p>Dressing</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled skin care or skilled transfer is not required in conjunction with dressing <p>May include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assistance with ordinary clothing Application of support stockings of the type that can be purchased without a physician's prescription Application of orthopedic devices such as splints and braces, or of artificial limbs, if considerable manipulation of the device or limb is not necessary 	<p>Dressing</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled skin care or skilled transfer is required in conjunction with dressing Application of anti-embolic or other pressure stockings that can be purchased only with a physician's prescription Application of orthopedic devices such as splints and braces, or of artificial limbs, if considerable manipulation of the device or limb is necessary Application of orthopedic devices such as splints and braces, or of artificial limbs when the client is still learning to use the device or limb

<p>Ambulation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled transfers are not required in conjunction with ambulation When assisting a client with adaptive equipment and the client is fully trained in the use of such equipment <p>When assisting someone in a cast and there is no need for observation and reporting to a nurse and there is no need for skilled skin care</p> <p>* Adaptive equipment may include, but is not limited to, gait belts, walkers, canes and wheelchairs</p>	<p>Ambulation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled transfers are required in conjunction with ambulation Assistance with adaptive equipment when the client is still being trained in the use of such equipment Assisting someone in a cast if there is a need for observation and reporting to a nurse or there is a need for skilled skin care.

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<p>* Attendants or IHSS Agencies shall not prescribe nor direct any type of exercise program for the client</p>		
<p>Transfers</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When the client has sufficient balance and strength to assist with the transfer to some extent Except for Hoyer lifts, adaptive equipment may be used in transfers, provided that the client is fully trained in the use of the equipment and can direct the transfer step by step <p>* Adaptive equipment may include, but is not limited to, gait belts, wheelchairs, tub seats, and grab bars</p>	<p>Transfers</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When the client is unable to assist with the transfer Use of Hoyer lifts is considered skilled Use of other adaptive equipment if the client is still being trained in the use of the equipment 	
<p>Positioning</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When the client is able to identify to the personal care staff, verbally, non-verbally or through others, when the position needs to be changed; and When skilled skin care is not required in conjunction with positioning <p>May include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Simple alignment in a bed, wheelchair, or other furniture 	<p>Positioning</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When the client is not able to identify to the caregiver when the position needs to be changed When skilled skin care is required in conjunction with positioning 	
<p>Bladder Care</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled transfer or skilled skin care is not required in conjunction with bladder care <p>May include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assisting the client to and from the bathroom Assistance with bed pans, urinals, and commodes Changing of clothing and pads of any kind used for the care of incontinence 	<p>Bladder Care</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When it involves disruption of the closed system for a Foley or suprapubic catheter, such as changing from a leg bag to a night bag Care of external catheters When skilled transfer or skilled skin care is required in conjunction with bladder care 	



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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Emptying of Foley catheter bags or suprapubic catheter bags only if there is no disruption of the closed system <p>* Attendants must be trained to understand what constitutes disruption of the closed system</p>		
<p>Bowel Care</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When skilled transfer or skilled skincare is not required in conjunction with bowel care <p>May include</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assisting the client to and from the bathroom Assistance with bed pans and commodes Changing of clothing and pads of any kind used for the care of incontinence Emptying of ostomy bags and assistance with other client-directed ostomy care is unskilled only when there is no need for skilled skin care or for observation and reporting to a nurse 	<p>Bowel Care</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When it a skilled transfer or skilled skin care is required in conjunction with bowel care <p>May include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Digital stimulation Enemas Care of ostomies that are new Care of ostomies when the client is unable to self-direct the care 	
<p>Medication Reminding</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When medications have been preselected, by the client, a family member, a nurse, or a pharmacist, and are stored in containers other than the prescription bottles, such as medication minders Medication minder containers must be clearly marked as to day and time of dosage, and must be kept in such a way as to prevent tampering <p>Only includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Inquiries as to whether medications were taken Verbal prompting to take medications Handing the appropriately marked medication minder container to the client Opening the appropriately marked medication minder container for the client if the client is physically unable to open the container 	<p>Medication Reminding</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> When it consists of putting the medication in the client's hand when the client can self-direct in the taking of medications

<p>Respiratory Care Only includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cleaning or changing the tubing for oxygen equipment • Filling the distilled water reservoir • Temporarily removing and replacing the cannula or mask from the client's face for purposes of shaving or washing the client's face 	<p>Respiratory Care May include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Postural drainage • Cupping • Adjusting oxygen flow within established parameters • Suctioning of mouth and nose 	
<p>Accompanying Accompanying the client to medical appointments, banking errands, basic household errands, clothes shopping, and grocery shopping to the extent necessary and as specified on the care plan only when an attendant is needed during the trip to provide one or more other unskilled personal care services</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When all the care that is provided by the attendant in relation to the trip is unskilled personal care • Accompanying the client to other services is also permissible as specified on the care plan, to the extent of time that the client would otherwise receive personal care services in the home 	<p>Accompanying Accompanying the client to medical appointments, banking errands, basic household errands, clothes shopping, and grocery shopping to the extent necessary and as specified on the care plan only when an attendant is needed during the trip to provide one or more HMA services</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When the care provided by the attendant in relation to the trip is HMA • Accompanying the client to other services is also permissible as specified on the care plan, to the extent of time that the client would otherwise receive HMA services in the home • Accompanying the client primarily to provide companionship is not a covered benefit
